Eppley Center

The Eugene C. Eppley Center is located on Shaw Lane in the heart of MSU's main campus. It is connected to the Minskoff Pavilion and North Business Building. Eppley Center is home to offices for faculty and staff, as well as student services. The School of Hospitality Business, Department of Finance, Multicultural Business Programs (MBP) and Undergraduate Academic Services (UAS) are all housed in Eppley Center.

Undergraduate Academic Services (Room E101)

Broad College of Business academic advisors are coordinators of your undergraduate experience. Multicultural Business Programs (Room E109)

Multicultural Business Programs (MBP) provides continuing student support to help ensure graduation, with individualized academic advising, tutoring, career development, and placement. MBP currently serve more than 650 multicultural students enrolled in business or pre-business majors. MBP also houses 4 student organizations that are open to all MSU students; Women in Business, Multicultural Business Students, National Association of Black Accountants, and the Native American & Hispanic Business students that are open to all MSU.

Broad Center for Student Engagement (Room E105)

The Broad Center for Student Engagement is a space designed to bring our students together with college partners and stakeholders. The moveable furniture allows students to use it as a study space, a meeting space, or a programming space.

Multicultural Business Programs Tutorial Center (Room E215)

The Multicultural Business Program offers free tutorial services to undergraduate students during the fall and spring semesters on a first-come-first-serve basis. This service provides approximately 200–350 students each semester with support in certain core business courses. Our tutors help students review concepts and practice problem solving and applications for these specific courses.

North Business Building

The North Business Building is located on Bogue Street, connected to the Minskoff Pavilion and Epley Center. Situated on the banks of the Red Cedar, it is currently home to many core business courses as well as many of the offices of Broad's faculty, including the Office of the Dean, Department of Accounting and Information Systems, Department of Management and the Department of Supply Chain Management.

Smaller Classrooms (Room N102)

Recitations typically take place in the smaller classrooms. Smaller classrooms allow for a close setting that simulates discussion and participation.

Large Lecture Halls (Room N130)

One of the largest lecture halls at MSU holding just over 600 students. There are entrances on the first and ground floors and 3 large monitors for easy viewing of lecture materials. Professor(s) typically wear a microphone for easy hearing. The white cords dropping down throughout the lecture hall are subtle microphones so students can avoid shouting when asking questions. In addition, to make a large lecture class more conducive to individual participation, they are often broken up into smaller groups called recitation groups, which meet weekly.

Broad Senate Store (Ground Floor)

Financial Analysis Laboratory (Room N4 and N5)

The Financial Analysis Laboratory provides the opportunity for hands-on training in financial modeling and valuation. The lab's hardware and software not only emulate a real trading room, but also enable a dynamic instructional setting. The department's Security Analysis and Portfolio Management course is taught in the lab. The lab is equipped with dual screen computers and a select number of Bloomberg terminals

Minskoff Pavilion

The Edward J. Minskoff Pavilion is located on Shaw Lane, connected to the Epley Center and North Business Building. It is a state-of-the-art facility covering 100,000 square feet and houses both the Russell Palmer Career Management Center and the Full-Time MBA program. The Minskoff Pavilion's design is focused around the concept of enhancing the Broad student experience with flexible spaces and cutting-edge technology. A Panera Bread is also located on the ground level of the facility.

Team Rooms (Ground Floor)

The team rooms are designed to give current Broad students spaces to study and collaborate. Each room contains screens powered by the Cisco Webex Room Kit Mini, which allows for cross-device screen sharing, including phone, laptop, and tablet devices. The walls of each of the team rooms are marker board which allows our students to write erase and rewrite the ideas they are working on.

William C. Gast Business Library (Law College Room 50)

The William C. Gast Business Library is the largest of the branches at MSU Libraries and has three business librarians, two support staff and approximately twenty student employees. The library provides seating for 499 and has wireless access to the internet throughout the facility. There are 7 group study rooms available to students, faculty, and staff. Laser printing, including color, is available from the computers or laptops through MSU Print accounts. Room 22 serves as an instruction and computer lab with 24 seats. The branch is open 99 hours each week during the fall and spring semesters. The library serves the Broad College of Business and the School of Human Resources and Labor Relations.
