Course Description

This course will provide an extensive understanding of insurance company functions, financial management, and operations in global insurance. Exploration of the excess and surplus lines insurance marketplace and the vital role the London market plays in worldwide insurance placement.

Course Overview

The course is a hybrid of in-class lectures and in-country site visits. The in-class material, assigned readings, and in-country material are all required to succeed in the course and have been designed for students to gain a deeper understanding of the unique culture and history of the London Insurance Market and how the Market adapted to shape modern insurance practices.

Attendance Policy:

You must participate in all required group activities in London.

Failure to attend any required session will result in the loss of points. Exceptions will be made only in the event of truly extenuating circumstances. If you are ill, contact Professor Humphreys as soon as possible.

Site visits: You must take pen-and-paper notes during sessions on campus and during all business and cultural site visits and guest lectures, while on site in London. If I see you not taking notes during a guest lecture or a site visit, you will lose participation points. Cell phones or other electronic devices are strictly prohibited. Site visits/cultural activities are the most important component of the participation grade. If you are not consistently and appropriately engaged during site visits, it will not be possible to earn all participation points.

Tardiness: **You must be on time.** Even if you are only a few minutes late, you will lose points for class participation in each incident. This is particularly important when we are preparing to leave on group transportation while in London.

Students' behavior reflects on Michigan State University. Therefore, **students must behave respectfully toward the host culture, its values, language, beliefs, and customs at all times**. Students must also be properly attired for all site visits. **For professional site visits**, proper, business professional attire for men includes a suit with tie, belt, dress shoes and socks. For women, business professional attire includes pants and blouse, skirt and blouse, or nice dress, in any case with dress shoes (nylons/tights optional).
